HARBETH'S NEW MODEL RECEIVES A CLUTCH OF GLOBAL AWARDS

Only a few months into its production and the ninth generation of Harbeth's original loudspeaker is being honoured by audio writers around the world. Award after award is bestowed on the Super HL5plus, from America to Russia and Japan to Germany, as it delights and entertains.

Online C|Net said the SHL5plus has "more than a little professional monitor in its make-up".

In America, as well as the Golden Ear Award (see above), *Stereophile's* legendary reviewer Art Dudley found a "fine, clear communicator of musical

timing", with technical measurements which were "beyond reproach".

Editor commendations were awarded by Russia's *Stereo & Video* and *Stereoplay* in Germany. Also in Germany, *Image-Hifi* magazine was delighted by a design with "nothing miss-

ing at all". For Japan's *Stereo* magazine the speaker was awarded Excellence status by a panel of four reviewers. Sister title *Stereo Sound* spoke of "excellent reproduction of harmonic structure", while *Audio Accessory* crowned it with a Best Component award.

at *Audio* was the new Monitor 40.2 which was warmly received by the editorial team.

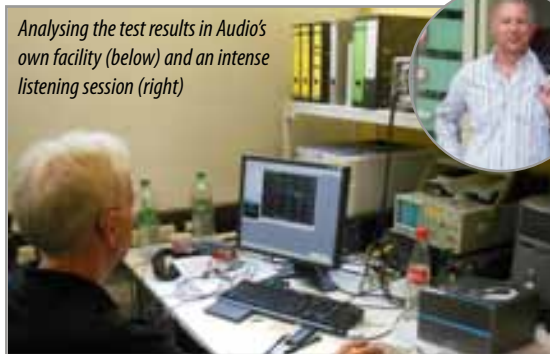

SOUTHERN ENDORSEMENT

AUSTRALIAN ONLINE REVIEW SITE UNEARTH'S HARBETH'S QUALITY

Antipodean reviewer Mark Gusew took a close look at Harbeth's popular Compact 7ES-3 monitor loudspeaker and found it very revealing, with impressive detail and a lush, euphoric sound.

Published by *StereoNet*, the review looks at Harbeth's heritage and the development of legendary BBC design ideas to create modern-day loudspeakers such as the Compact 7ES-3.

Mark Gusew (inset) noted how the Harbeths managed to exhibit a great deal of detail and complexity.

"They are very revealing of musical nuances and harmonics, particularly in the midrange and treble regions", he discovered.

"This initial impression remained throughout the review period", he informed his audience, adding: "Well re-

corded natural instruments and voices were portrayed really cleanly and were relayed with a lifelike realism."

There was also praise for the C7's HF ability: "The treble was very smooth, highly detailed, reasonably extended and was never harsh, taxing or overbearing".

Overall, the writer commended how music was made to sound "sweet and pleasant", with the treble "well integrated with the midrange: no apparent gaps", leading him to conclude that the crossover design was "spot on".



Meanwhile the Compact 7 fared exceptionally well with wooden acoustic instruments (strings, piano and gui-

tar) while female voices were found to be "very pleasing and had a wonderfully lush, euphoric sound".

HK SHOWING M40.2

REVEALING MONITORS

During his development of the new Ultimate Reference M40.2 design, Harbeth's Alan Shaw explains the journey from the "peculiar" LS5/8 of the 1970s to the M40.2

During the six-month design process of the new M40.2, Harbeth's owner and designer reminded himself what a compromise the similarly-proportioned two-way LS5/8 design was.

"We have many pairs of the old LS5/8 here at Harbeth HQ, traded-in (for Harbeth M40s) from BBC studios, so I think we know better than anyone, even the BBC themselves, how these production LS5/8 speakers actually measure, behave and sound", says Alan.

Intended as a drop-in replacement for the BBC's old LS5/8 model, Harbeth's M40 family was



conceived as a three-way design (separate bass unit, midrange unit and a tweeter) to replace the mere two-way (bass unit, tweeter; but no midrange drive unit) of the LS5/8. The Harbeth M40 was introduced when the Rogers UK factory closed around 1997 and serviceability of the ageing 5/8 became problematic for professional customers.

Alan explains the rationale behind the Harbeth design. "The M40 was created as a three-way for the extremely obvious reason that the audio spectrum needs to be split three ways if the speaker has a large, 12-inch (300mm) bass unit because, no matter how you tinker with such a system, bass units are always at their best in the bass region, and midrange units are optimised for midrange, relieved of the stress of moving air and handling high power."

"Because the LS5/8 was so extremely peculiar in its sound balance it never found a domestic market nor even a professional market outside British broadcasting, but the M40 was sufficiently superior to the old 5/8 that it found both a hi-fi market and a pro market."

With the Harbeth M40 finding favour in many domestic set-

tings it was in 2008 that Alan undertook a mid-course review of the design as its key market became the domestic arena. The hugely successful M40.1 was born.

The most important element in the journey towards the M40.2 has been the simply delightful success of the SuperHL5plus, which has captured (and captivated!) a whole new audience of Harbeth customers.

"It's obvious to me that the design innovations embodied in the SHL5plus, with the universal praise and many awards it's received, were a signpost to how we could develop the Harbeth reference loudspeakers, and the SuperHL5plus technological improvements are evidently what the market very much likes", says the designer. "I observed the market, I listened to the feedback, I learned from the reviews, and I have applied the same magic that went into the SHL5plus to the M40.2. And some."

Production of the M40.2 will commence later this month with the order book filling-up for 2016 deliveries around the world.

AN INVESTMENT IN HAPPINESS – SPEAKERS MADE BY AND FOR MUSIC LOVERS

The Dutch online audio site hifi.nl has published a review of the Harbeth P3ESR and SHL5plus by writer René van Es.
